

Texas Weighted Caseload Study

The Texas Legislature has directed the Texas Indigent Defense Commission to conduct a Weighted Caseload Study:

"for the purpose of determining guidelines for establishing a maximum allowable caseload for a criminal defense attorney that... allows the attorney to give each indigent defendant the time and effort necessary to ensure effective representation."

As the preeminent professional association of defense lawyers in Texas, TCDLA is a *crucial partner* in this effort. Representatives of TCDLA have been appointed to the Advisory Panel and other members will serve on the Delphi panel in the later stages of the project.

Documenting what it really takes to defend different types of cases will <u>advance justice</u> by moving policymakers toward data-driven decisions on indigent defense.

- Builds objective evidence on defender resource needs in order to make the case for appropriate funding at the state and local levels
- Increases transparency about how indigent defense services are being delivered in Texas
- Positions criminal defense attorneys to provide higher quality services for court-appointed clients and be fairly compensated for their work

TIDC is partnering with the Public Policy Research Institute at Texas A&M (PPRI) to conduct the study. This fall, PPRI in coordination with TCDLA will begin recruiting attorneys to participate in the study.

- Participants will be trained in the use of timekeeping software, then asked to record the time spent on cases for 12 weeks.
- As a "thank you" for participating attorneys, and to make it a little more fun, some incentives are planned. Everyone will receive a \$50 gift card for helping, and other giveaways are being developed. Consenting attorneys will also be recognized for their contributions in the final report.
